- 50 questions
- Topics include employment data, perceptions of labour market, views on role of universities, fees, employment support



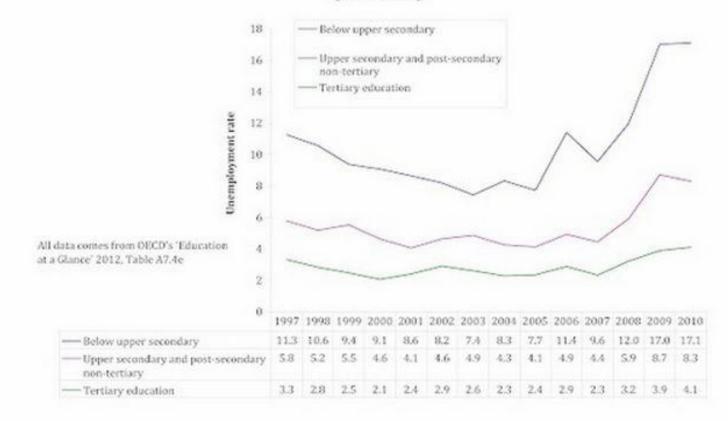
Challenges

- No brain drain, but we are not making the most of talent in the region
- Graduates have poor view of Yorkshire labour market, and wages flat
- Internships at very low level (3%)

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Graduates outperform the wider population across the OECD

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Bottom line benefit of graduates

- Graduates create productivity increases in businesses – 30% higher where all staff are graduates
- Graduates create productivity increases in places – Every 1% growth in grads creates 0.5% growth in GDP
- Graduates bring innovation Innovative businesses have twice as many graduates

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Positives

- Graduate wages over time do grow ahead of inflation
- Usage and rating of university careers service provision up significantly
- Graduates want to stay here, and view Yorkshire positively overall
- Examples of great practice from public and private sector leading positive change
